**Retrieval placements – nursing students** <u>This three-minute brief</u> (networked devices only) has been prepared for all those colleagues who support student nurses in practice. **National Day of Memory in honour of those lost to Honour-Based Abuse** This coming Monday will see the 11<sup>th</sup> day in memory of those who lost their lives to honour-based abuse. Honour-based abuse (HBA) refers to violence, intimidation, or coercion used to protect or restore the perceived 'honour' of an individual, family, or community. It is rooted in the belief that someone's behaviour, most often a woman's or girl's, has brought, or may bring, shame or dishonour to those around them. Perceived transgressions can include:

- Having a relationship with someone.
- Refusing a forced marriage.
- Wearing make-up or certain clothes or socialising in a way which the family/community disapproves of.
- Being, or coming out as gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender or intersex.

HBA takes a wide range of forms and in the most extreme cases, women and girls are killed for this perception of dishonour – there are estimated to be 12 such 'honour killings' every year in the UK.

HBA can differ from other forms of abuse such as Domestic Abuse, because it may involve multiple perpetrators. Immediate and extended family members and members of the wider community may contribute to enforce rules they perceive as maintaining honour. HBA is a way to control and punish women for their choices, to restrain and restrict them from living their lives, to exercise power and control over them.

The National Day of Memory falls on 14 July because this is the birthday of Shafilea Ahmed, a bright, courageous young woman who was murdered by her parents for bringing perceived "shame" on her family. She would have been 39 years old this year. There is support available for victims and survivors of Honour-Based Abuse.
