Celebrating Learning Disability nursing Tomorrow (1 November) is Learning Disability Nursing Day. On that day, in 1919, the first Learning Disability nurse was officially registered. LD nurses provide specialist healthcare and support to people with learning disabilities, as well as their families, carers, and support teams. Their practice spans the lifespan and addresses physical, mental, emotional, psychological, educational, spiritual, and social needs. Rooted in person-centred and inclusive approaches, they apply in-depth knowledge of rights-based legislation and are key to reducing health inequalities and addressing unmet health needs. Their expertise in communication and implementing reasonable adjustments is vital to improving health outcomes. Learning Disability Nurses work across diverse environments, reflecting the breadth and transferability of their skills. Their practice is guided by evidence-based care, legal frameworks, professional standards, and local and national policy drivers. We are delighted to celebrate them, today, tomorrow, and every day!
