PROJECT UPDATE

Welcome to the March 2022 newsletter. As you will see from the photos later on in the newsletter, construction work on both developments is progressing well, with the blockwork and roof works at The ANCHOR Centre well underway as well as internal partitioning and preparation for window installation. The concrete works at The Baird continue with the upper floors now emerging from the ground. In addition, work to prepare the foundations for installation, in the coming months, of the link bridge connecting The Baird Family Hospital to ARI and RACH is now underway. Information about access and traffic management changes around the Emergency Department, to accommodate this work, has been distributed widely over recent weeks to make sure patients, staff and emergency services are aware of the changing arrangements.



The construction programme continues to make good progress despite the challenges presented by the COVID restrictions and the well-rehearsed impact of global and UK specific market force issues which are affecting materials availability, lead times, cost and staff availability. These issues continue to be kept under constant review with our construction partner, GRAHAM Construction and will continue to put pressure on the project in terms of potential cost and programme impact.

In parallel with construction, the team continue to work hard to complete the internal design details ready for construction. This considerable exercise and will continue well into 2022.

The functional commissioning team are now actively engaging with operational teams to begin to develop detailed plans for both buildings. This is a substantial undertaking and will need to involve both project team members and clinical and operational staff from services across a wide range of themes throughout 2022 and 2023. This work will include preparing for



occupation and relocation to the new facilities, equipping, policy development, IT systems and infrastructure, communication and also plans to decommission the maternity hospital, prior to demolition in 2024.

This year we have three important and demanding work streams working in parallel:

- Construction
- Design completion and sign off
- Technical and functional commissioning planning

BAIRD AND ANCHOR SITE PROGRESS

Here comes the technical bit..... We caught up with Graham Davidson, our Technical Supervisor, for an update on site progress. Graham is due to retire this month and this will be his last appearance in our newsletter. Thanks to Graham for all his contributions and for keeping us right with the technical information.

Despite changeable weather conditions such as frost, rain and high winds, the last quarter period has seen steady progress made to both the Baird and ANCHOR buildings.



On **The Baird Family Hospital** the main theme continues to be pouring of in-situ concrete. The lower ground floor is almost complete with respect to concrete works and several areas have been offered up to NHS Grampian to undertake an inspection of walls, columns, floors and ceilings to ensure the "fair faced" concrete finished product is to the quality that we expect. I am pleased to say that what we have witnessed to date is of a good standard.

Like Jackie mentioned, work on the Baird link bridge has started. This is a significant piece of work and will see a bridge linking The Baird Family Hospital into the existing RACH and ARI link bridge. The bridge will have four concrete support columns along its length. Before the columns can be built a number of ground piles have to be bored and filled with concrete. These will provide the foundations that the column structures will be built on.



Work on **The ANCHOR Centre** is moving at pace and the building itself is now 90% watertight. A temporary "crash deck" is in the process of being built over the open atrium area and, once complete, this will see the building fully wind and watertight. Other exterior works have seen the installation of the window frames to the East and West sides of the building. These are temporarily boarded up prior to the glass being fitted a few weeks later. Once all of the windows are installed and the weatherboarding completed, work will commence on the curtain walling systems.



This typically consists of a lightweight aluminum frame onto which glazed and coloured infill panels are fixed.



The bricklayers have now completed work to the plantrooms at the South of the site and are currently working on the lift shaft areas within the building as well as continuing building work to the East and West elevations.

The roofing contractor has completed the hot melt system which covers and seals the concrete roof areas.

A very important part of the construction works is the fire protection of any structural steel columns or beams. These are delivered to site pre-painted with intumescent fire paint, however damages can occur and these have to be repainted before it gets covered by external cladding or internal plasterboard.

Internally dry lining walls and partitions are being built, plasterboard has been fitted to one side of the walls and you can now see the different rooms taking shape. The main stairs within the atrium have been installed and once completed, this will be seen as one of the main features of the building.



Towards the end of March, the Mechanical and Electrical (M&E) contractor is due to start work. This will see electrical cables, hot and cold pipework as well as ventilation ductwork to name but a few being fitted above ceilings and in behind plasterboard walls. Having the M&E contractor on site is another milestone in the project as this is seen as a major step forward to getting rooms finished.

Discussions are at an early stage looking at how the "breakthrough" linking the ANCHOR building into the existing Radiotherapy Centre will be undertaken. This is an element of the work that will be carefully coordinated to ensure there is no disruption to the delivery of patient care within the Radiotherapy building itself.


