Do not eat or drink before your operation.




Take your temperature.




Take your blood pressure.

The nurse may put cream on your hand or arm.



The doctors will put a tube in your hand



You will be asleep for your operation.



The staff will take you to back to the ward.

You may feel sleepy.



After your operation you will wake up in a room like this.

The nurse will be with you.



You can have a drink when you wake up.



The nurse will take your temperature and blood pressure.



Tell the nurse if you -




Have any pain.
